Fostering Relationships and Partnerships

As a Catholic School system we nurture positive relationships to become true partners with our community, which we believe will truly help us better serve our students. We are committed to involving all our stakeholders as we develop, implement and review programs, decisions and services. We encourage co-operation and collaboration to create an environment which supports trust and encourages teamwork and partnerships.

In Kenora we are very fortunate to be immersed in a caring, involved community. There is a close relationship among the schools, bringing students together for fun, sport, jamborees, powwows, mentoring, reading buddies and competitions. Our students can be seen bringing cheer and companionship to the Home for the Aged, sharing with the less fortunate, cleaning the environment, raising funds for various causes and learning about our community through our many partnerships.



Roots of Empathy

At the heart of the program are a neighborhood infant and parent who visit the classroom every three weeks over the school year. This is where Kerri and Monika Favreau come in! During monthly visits students observe baby Monika's development and label her feelings. In this experimental learning, Monika is the "Teacher" who helps the students identify and reflect on their own feelings and the feelings of others. This "emotional literacy" lays the foundation for more safe and caring classrooms, where children are more competent in understanding their own feelings and the feelings of others (empathy) and are therefore less likely to physically, psychologically and emotionally hurt each other through bullying and other cruelties.

Our St. Louis students have become more empathetic and have learned many valuable lessons through piloting this exciting program.

Welcome to Kindergarten



On a lovely evening in May, over 65 families gathered at Saint Thomas Aquinas High School to learn about methods to enhance their children's learning before they come to school.

The Kenora Catholic District School Board, in partnership with The Learning Partnership hosted the second Welcome to Kindergarten™ (WTK) event. This event provided pre-school children (and their families) with the resources and experiences to begin their formal education with a foundation in early learning nurtured in their homes. The program is designed to give preparatory resources and experiences to pre-kindergarten children to aide their school success and lifelong learning.

All attendees received the early learning resources in the Welcome to Kindergarten Bag and learned strategies for using the resources at home. At the orientation, families connected with kindergarten teachers, school resource personnel and staff from community support agencies. These early years educators provided training on why family planned activities using the resources in the Welcome to Kindergarten Bag will help their children be better prepared for school and learning.

The newest of our students were able to leave with a head start in their education and a welcome to the life of schooling.

Aboriginal Concert and Conference a Big Success!

200 people can't be wrong! That is how many people attended each day of the Aboriginal Conference entitled Community, Culture, and Curriculum: A Focus on Aboriginal Education.

The conference took place on April 21 and 22 and featured keynote speakers Ricky White, Dr. Pamela Toulouse, Tom Jackson and Dr. Larry Swartz. The breakout sessions focused on a variety of topics including the ways of the Elders, community schools, outreach to parents, and self esteem.

The conference also hosted a concert at Saint Thomas Aquinas High School that was a benefit for the homeless. Tom Jackson and Sierra Noble headlined the concert that also featured local talent from our high school. The evening was a sell out event!

The participants of the conference were also treated to a student panel discussion, art work and projects from students across the board, a performance by The Whitefish Bay Singers and Dancers and a lunch time concert by Sierra Noble.

Another first for the conference goers was the newly released monograph on Aboriginal Self Esteem written by Pamela Toulouse and first released at our conference.

This concert set the stage for the successful "Singing for Supper" event held in November 2008.











Teaching and Learning Excellence

As a Catholic school system we truly believe all students have the ability to learn within the proper environment and be able to work to their full potential. We value knowledge in the context of faith.

In virtually ever corner of each of our schools, you will see a celebration of student work and achievement and evidence of God-given talent. Excellence is provincially recognized in the consistent high academic standards and achievements and in provincial teacher recognition. It is also obvious in quality public speeches, dramatic performances and musical productions. Students are always encouraged to challenge themselves and to produce work for which they are proud. We offer a wide variety of extracurricular programs to enrich our students' learning experience such as outdoor education, intramural and extracurricular sports, yearbook club, Festival du Voyageur, Books for Breakfast, special events, arts and crafts, drama, PALS, student leadership program, bike rodeo, and many other activities.

Data Driven:

MISA Project Leads Our Schools Higher

The MISA (Managing Information for Student Achievement) project enhances evidence informed decision making for school improvement, through the review of data.

In this year's project, teachers identified different areas of need and then responded to these needs by developing action plans within our schools to increase our efficiency and ability to enhance student achievement. For example, at St. Louis school, reading comprehension was identified as a student need, specifically in making connections to self, to text, and to the world. Teachers focused on "think alouds" as an instructional tool to be modeled and used in shared, independent and guided reading. Results of the assessment then guided further specific focused strategies and lead to further re-assessments. All of our schools continue to improve in their abilities to use and create successful assessment for learning opportunities.

Specialist High Skills Majors and Multi-Skills Training Center



The Specialist High-Skills Major sector continues to expand the borders of its Hospitality and Tourism program. This year the program has reached out to the local resort owners and managers to form partnerships to provide our students with more experiential learning opportunities. Two new High Skills Majors have been applied for and this has resulted in a new partnership with Lambton College in Sarnia. The partnership will lead to a future High Skills Major in the Energy sector.

The Multi-Skills Training Center is still in progress this year. This facility will initially provide for construction and trades courses with a plan to grow towards provision of alternative energy courses. The Multi-Skills Training Center will include a large work area that is able to adjust to allow for other industry needs, a drafting room with computers and a high tech classroom with the capability to provide courses through distance education. Our goal is to see this new partnership, with our partner, Confederation College, grow and develop as we build new areas in our school to accommodate more modern and varied opportunities for our students. We continue to stress the need to reach every student and help all to succeed! Completion of the Multi-Skills Training Center is scheduled for February 2009.

Visit from the Minister of Northern Development and Mines

Mike Gravelle, the Minister for Northern Development and Mines met with Board and school administrators early in the year. He brought greetings and expressed his support for the Multi-Skills Project. The Minister made comments on behalf of his department regarding the innovative concept and the necessity for such a project in the North. The focus of the Ministry funding is directed toward the Energy sector, in particular, alternative energy

Improving our Instruction - What do the Numbers Tell Us?

We have seen the benefit of the Teaching-Learning Critical Pathway in ratcheting up the quality and tightening the focus of our teaching in all of our schools. The School Effectiveness Framework also showed us the need to help teachers to have more job-embedded professional development opportunities in their daily work. We have seen more effective practice in classrooms and a greater use of high-yield strategies in all areas of teaching and learning.

Students have improved in literacy and numeracy. We were able to reach our target of 75% of grade six students at the provincial standard in reading this year. While we were not able to get there in writing, our score of 70% represents an increase of 7 percentage points over last year. We have also maintained a higher percentage than the province in numeracy at grade 6 by achieving 68% at the provincial standard (of level 3 or 4).

In our grade 9 mathematics assessment, we have seen an increase in academic students' achievement scores. In our applied scores, we saw a decline and have been working on how to improve instruction and encourage success for all of our students. Our grade 10 literacy scores showed a modest increase and we are focusing more on literacy across the curriculum. This focus will ensure that all students are given the opportunity to show their literacy skills in every subject area and will bring a cross curricular focus that will enhance their achievement and learning. We are proud of the way that our teachers are using data to inform their teaching. We can see the results of their professionalism and we continue to support them to reach higher achievement in all areas of the curriculum.

When Life Gives You Lemons – Faites une livre! It is not always easy to teach French Immersion in a predominantly English community. When elementary teachers want to reinforce reading skills or increase the amount of exposure to text, they have an unlimited supply of environmental print—the words from the ongoing use of language in a society. These do not exist in French in Kenora. So an enterprising group of primary teachers have created their own books in French using pictures of objects in their environment and the faces of their students. The Result? Kids love these books and want to read them first! Our students are reading more than ever - and in French!













Communicating Effectively

As a Catholic school system we are committed to open and honest communication based on respect and integrity. We also believe communication is only effective if it is two-way. Effective communication of ideas and information promote our core values and our vision for our students.

The Kenora Catholic District School Board has implemented many formal and informal opportunities for effective communication with each other, our students, our parents and our community. Press Releases, our board website, weekly class updates, Student Council Meetings, Parent Council Meetings, Regular Board Meetings, Principal's Council Meetings, monthly newsletters, event calendars, and important information bulletins are just some of the tools we use to ensure we are communicating effectively. Parents and teachers communicate openly, sharing concerns, ideas and successes. Opportunities abound for staff to communicate with each other, the Board and other schools as well. Professional Learning communities enable teachers to grow together and meet common goals. This annual report is just another example of how we share information with our parents, teachers, community, partners and stakeholders on key statistical and financial information.

Class Size Statistics

Class size is an important issue and we strive to keep our class sizes smaller so our students have more one-on-one support from teachers and education assistants. 96.4% of our primary classes have 20 or fewer students while 100% of our classes have 23 students or fewer. In the Kenora Catholic District School Board that means that only one primary class has an enrollment of more than 20 students.

100% of our grade 3 and 4 split classes have 23 or fewer students.

22% of our students are taking Ojibway as a second language. 26% of our students are taking instruction in French Immersion and 31% of our students are taking French as a second language.



Championing Continuous Improvement

As a Catholic school system we believe in excellence. To achieve excellence, we must strive for improvement by establishing goals, clear planning, aligning of resources, effective implementation and assessment of progress.

During 2008 each JK/K to grade 6 school completed a School Self-Assessment as part of the School Effectiveness Framework. Following this data collection, the School Board team completed a District Review. School Improvement Teams at each of our schools then used this data to develop their own customized improvement plans based on their school's unique needs. These plans focused on three key improvement goals for each school. The Board Improvement Team met and reviewed all school and board data to develop the board improvement plan. The result of this extensive plan to improve student achievement was one board improvement goal:

We are committed to ensuring that Catholicity is embedded into our daily practice. Our focused goal is to improve writing for all students.

Teaching-Learning Critical Pathway

Teaching-Learning Critical Pathway is a structure for our professional learning community that focuses on student work, guided by the curriculum expectations and the needs of our students. Teachers do focused lessons based on identified student needs, common assessments and they work on an engaging theme for students to try to increase student achievement.

What do our teachers have to say about Teaching-Learning Critical Pathway:

"I've been inspired to try learning stations so that my students can use their multiple intelligences. I want to give them a chance to have some differentiated instruction." – Mary Candline, Teacher

"My students were inspired to start our pathway. They were able to make connections and have rich discussions about our global village." – Mark Favreau, Teacher

Successful Programs for Students Unable to attend Regular School Programs

Our board provides a variety of programs for students who are unable to attend regular school programs. As a small Board we can tailor the program to meet the needs of the individual student using a multi-disciplinary team approach. Programs consist of an academic component which is delivered or monitored by teachers during the school day or after school. Co-operative education and other forms of experiential learning are provided as needed, depending on the age of the student. Counseling and other social services are provided through community agencies tailored to the needs of the specific student involved. Parents are involved in planning prior to re-entry into school to ensure success for the student.

Smart Boards and New Computer Portal on the Horizon

Technology allows students to interact in some pretty amazing ways. One example of this technology is Smart Boards. A Smart Board is an interactive white board which is connected to a computer and allows students and teachers the ability to interact via the board to the computer. Three enthusiastic teachers, Darren Benson, Gisele Dufresne and Jamey Robertson, one from each of our elementary schools, have volunteered to pilot this technology in their classrooms starting last spring. The teachers will share their learning with others and the board will grow in its abilities to use technology to effectively communicate our curriculum.

As well, this year a committee was struck to review our current website and email system and to make recommendations. The committee, comprised of staff, students, a parent council member and a board member, recommended that a new KCDSB Website integrate the following:

- · Enhanced Collaboration (Parent Council, Staff, Students)
- · Online Document Repository
- · Email (Students, Teachers, Administrators)
- · Access To Files From Home
- · Portals (Students, Teachers, Parents, Administrators)

Through a Request for Proposal, IBM was chosen as the supplier of a solution to create a new website and portal for our board. The portal will allow for further technological gains to be made in our classrooms and in our connections with students.










EQAO RESULTS






Grade 6 Reading Provincial Comparison




Grade 6 Writing Provincial Comparison




Grade 3 Reading Provincial Comparison




Grade 6 Mathematics Provincial Comparison




Grade 3 Writing Provincial Comparison




Grade 9 Academic Mathematics




Grade 3 Mathematics Provincial Comparison

Farewell Dr. Allan Craig



On Saturday, June 7, 2008 the Kenora Catholic District School Board and the Catholic community gathered at Notre Dame Church for the Eucharistic Liturgy to give thanks to God for the many blessings bestowed upon us through the leadership and significant contribution to Catholic Education during Dr. Allan Craig's eight-year tenure as Director of Education for our board. The celebration of Dr. Craig's career continued into the evening at the Best Western Lakeside Inn, with a spiritual message through presentations and song "I Hope You Dance" (Womack), prepared by Sister Maria; congratulatory messages and best wishes from dignitaries, family, and educational colleagues; musical entertainment by Darcy Ura and high school students under his direction. Although Dr. Allan Craig's retirement date was August 31, 2008, his presence is still felt within the system.

Dr. Allan Craig has been a champion leader in Catholic Education throughout his career. As a young man he was the coach of the Gymnastics team at North York school and led the team to ten Gymnastic Championships. His love for hockey led him from backyard rink to junior A, throughout university and spilled over into his time as a player and coach of the Newtonbrook Teacher's Hockey Team. After completing his Master's in Education in the 80's he was awarded a sabbatical to complete a doctoral program. His success in several North York School Administrative roles opened up many opportunities at the

provincial level including Educational Officer for the Ministry of Education in 1996, Assessment Officer for EQAO in Toronto and lead Education Officer for Ontario. He was then asked to represent Canada in the Third International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS), grades 3, 4, 7, 8, 12, OAC and to work on the development of the Grade 6 provincial mathematics assessment. The funny part is he'd never been a mathematics teacher!

The North beckoned Dr. Allan Craig back in August 2000 when he accepted the role of Director of Education for the Kenora Catholic District School Board and he has been dedicated to our board ever since. In April 2008, Dr. Allan Craig was recognized and honored by the Ontario Catholic Supervisory Officers Association with the "Distinguished Leadership Award" for his outstanding contribution and leadership in education.

Dr. Allan Craig was quoted as saying...."I have learned that Catholic leadership is about collaborative service. We accomplish more together than we can accomplish individually.
